

Office of Research, Planning, and Effectiveness Transfer Follow-up Survey Report (Fall 2012)

I. Introduction

The purpose of the Transfer Follow-Up Survey is to learn how satisfied former students are with their NMC education and transfer experience. These data are used in the measurement of institutional effectiveness and in guiding improvements of our services and offerings.

Transfer Student Population Highlights:

- The top three transfer institutions in fall 2012 were Ferris State University, Grand Valley State University, and Michigan State University, respectively, accounting for 42% of 419 total transfers (see Appendix A for additional detail on transfer institutions)
- 82% of total transfers were to a 4-year college or university
- 18% of total transfers were to other community colleges (76% of this group were to 14 of the other 28 Michigan community colleges)

Transfer Student Survey Highlights:

- 97% of survey respondents agreed that a NMC education is a good value for the money
- 95% of respondents agreed that they would recommend NMC to others
- 93% of survey respondents agreed that NMC is a good place to meet one's learning objectives and educational goals
- 91% of survey respondents agreed they achieved their educational goal for attending NMC
- 30% of respondents reported they were required to take courses at their transfer institution that are similar to those they took at NMC (up from 23% in Fall 2011)

II. Survey Methodology

The NMC Data Mart* was queried to generate the population of former students who attended NMC in spring 2012 and then transferred to a 4-yr college/university or a 2-year college in fall 2012. The query generated a population of 419 students. For a two-week period beginning in late October 2012, NMC-Research Services administered the transfer survey to this group of transfer students. One hundred sixty two students agreed to participate in the survey, yielding a response rate of 39%; with regard to ongoing administration of the transfer survey, this response rate is the same as fall 2011, slightly higher than in spring 2011 (37%), and slightly lower than previous years (44% in 2010, 56% in 2009, and 42% in 2007).

All department-specific comments from this survey will be forwarded to the appropriate Chair or Administrator. The list of students who wish to be contacted by NMC staff about transferring credits back to NMC to be awarded appropriate certificates or Associate degrees will be forwarded to the Registrar's office.

*The Data Mart is updated frequently with student transfer data retrieved from the National Student Clearinghouse Student Tracker Data.

III. Survey Results

Demographics

Comparable to past administrations of the transfer survey, a higher percentage of female (61%) than male (40%) students agreed to participate (56% female in fall 2011). These numbers are in line with a slightly higher female population in NMC's total fall student population (54%). The median age of survey respondents is 21 years (mean=25), which closely compares to a fall 2011 transfer survey respondent group median age of 21 years (mean=24), but is younger than was observed in 2010 (median=27; mean=30).

Educational Goals

Approximately 52% of survey respondents reported their primary educational goal while attending NMC was to earn some general education credits and then transfer to a 4-year college or university, while an additional 41% reported their primary goal was to earn an Associate degree and transfer (Table 1).

Approximately 91% of all survey respondents reported they had achieved their educational goal, up slightly from 90% in fall 2012 and 83% in spring 2011. Of the 44% of respondents reporting their primary educational goal was to earn an Associate degree or certificate at NMC, 82% indicated they had done so. A cross-tabulation of primary goal and goal accomplishment indicates that respondents reporting their goal was to earn general education credits and transfer were more likely to report having achieved their goal.

The number of survey participants reporting having earned a degree or certificate decreased from 43% in fall 2011 to 37% in fall 2012, with 35% earning a degree and 2% earning a certificate. Survey respondents indicating they *did not* complete a degree were asked to indicate why through selection of one or more stated reasons; most frequently selected reasons included "I followed transfer information that did not require a degree" (32%; n=33) and "I wanted to transfer as soon as possible" (24%; n=25). Additionally, 25% (n=26) cited a reason *other* than those listed, including *I was dual enrolled* and some variation of *NMC did not offer classes/program of choice* (Table 2). A follow-up item asked this group of respondents to choose the *one primary* reason for not completing a degree, with 24% indicating "I followed transfer information that did not require a degree."

Respondents were also asked to indicate the highest degree they are seeking, with the following results.

The majority of responding transfer students (56%) indicated they are seeking a Bachelor's degree, while an additional 32% reported they are seeking a Master's degree.

Transfer Institution

The fall 2012 transfer survey included two new items assessing college or university of transfer and home campus versus NMC's University Center campus. Tables 4 and 5 display results.

One hundred and thirteen students indicated they attend one of the UC partner schools, with 30% of this group reporting they attend the University Center in Traverse City. A cross-tabulation of campus attended and goal accomplishment indicates that respondents reporting they attend the University Center were less likely to report having achieved their goal.

Transferring Credits Back to NMC/MACRAO

Survey respondents were asked how interested they would be in transferring credits they have earned at their current school back to NMC so that they may be awarded an appropriate certificate or Associate degree. In fall 2012 this question was conditionally asked of only those respondents indicating No or Don't Know to "Did you earn a degree from NMC?" and Yes, No or Don't Know to "Did you earn a certificate from NMC?" The majority of respondents (67%) reported some level of interest, ranging from slightly interested to very interested, with 27% indicating they are very interested (Table 6a); 70% of this respondent group (n=49) indicated someone from staff may contact them regarding transferring credits back to NMC.

Those indicating they are not at all interested in transferring credits earned at their current school back to NMC were asked to indicate the main reason why. Table 6b displays results.

Survey participants were asked if they had earned their MACRAO stamp* while at NMC. In recent years, survey results have indicated the majority of respondent's report they *have* earned their MACRAO stamp, however, only 40% of current survey participants, and 37% in fall 2011, responded positively. Most frequently cited reasons for not earning the MACRAO stamp include "Did not attend NMC long enough to complete the requirements," "Not aware of the MACRAO requirements," and "Already had or did not need."

Advising/Credit Transfer

NMC's goal is to provide accurate and consistent transfer and academic advice across the college. Survey results reveal that students received advice from a number of sources, with respondents identifying top three sources as their current schools' transfer information, NMC faculty advisor, and NMC advising staff (50%, 35%, and 33%, respectively). In addition, respondents indicated they received transfer and academic advice from the NMC transfer guide (27%) and a parent or family member (25%). Table 7 displays results.

Survey respondents were next asked to identify their <u>primary</u> source of transfer information, with the single largest group (27%) citing their current schools' transfer information or advisor. Additionally, 19% cited an *NMC faculty advisor*, 18% cited *NMC advising staff*, and 11% cited *Other college staff member*. Sources *Other* than those listed (8%) include high school counselor, professor or "did it on my own."

Regarding advisor assistance with various aspects of service, survey respondents consistently reported they were satisfied or very satisfied with the assistance they received (Table 8).

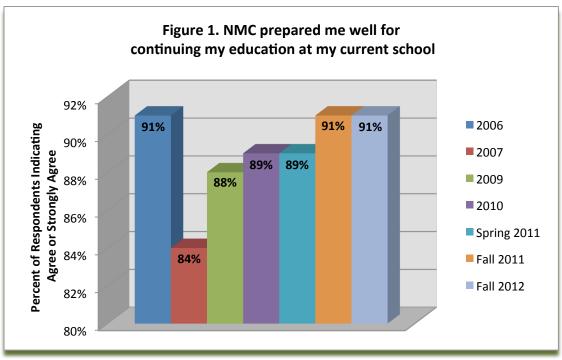
In addition, 97% of respondents indicated they were satisfied or very satisfied with the number of credits that transferred to their current institution. Regarding the 3% (n=5) of respondents indicating they were dissatisfied, were associated with the following transfer institutions: Central Michigan University, Michigan State University, Northern Michigan University, Western Michigan University College, and the University of Michigan.

Approximately 32% of survey respondents reported they had an NMC course or courses that did not transfer to their current institution, while 30% indicated they had to take a course/s at their transfer institution similar to courses taken at NMC. 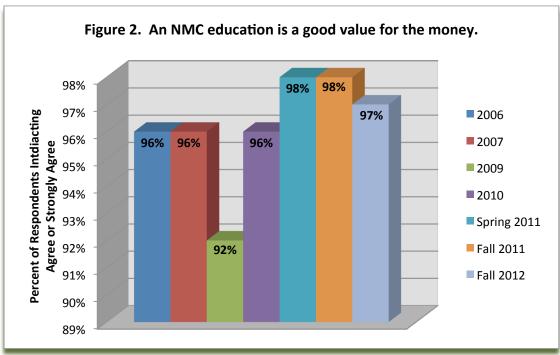
Sixty-five percent of survey respondents agreed to have NMC staff contact them regarding identified transfer problems, up from 41% in fall 2011.

Institutional Effectiveness

The percentage of survey respondents agreeing that NMC prepared them well for continuing their education at their current school had gradually increased since 2007, when 84% reported they agreed or strongly agreed, and now holds at 91% in fall 2012 (Figure 1). The current survey, along with spring and fall 2011 results, continues to realize a high level of agreement with regard to the statement "An NMC education is a good value for the money" (Figure 2).

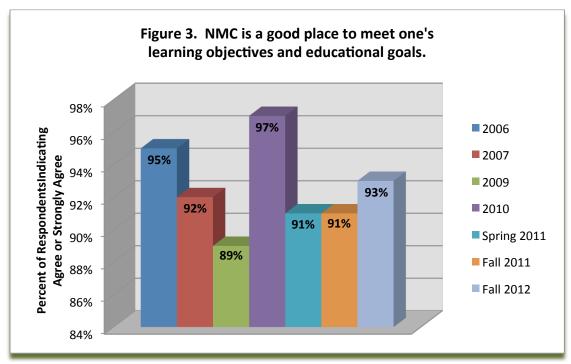


Note: Sampling methods for 2007 differed from previous and current year. Survey not conducted in 2008.

Ninety-three percent of survey respondents agreed that NMC is a good place to accomplish one's educational goals, which is up from fall 2012, but still a decrease from 2010 (Figure 3). Finally, 95% of transfer survey student respondents agreed they would recommend NMC to others, a primary measure for successful student engagement.

Students that disagreed with the above statements responded with comments describing why.

- Didn't feel welcomed by anyone
- NMC didn't challenge me enough, high school classes were harder
- Didn't learn anything in some classes, felt instructors didn't care
- Charged more for Maritime Academy credits because of our potential future earnings
- Young people should leave Traverse City to be on their own for the college experience
- NMC really didn't offer many classes that would have been in my field
- Wish I would have started out in a bigger school

Additional Comments:

In what areas or skills could you have been better prepared before transferring?

Noted areas/skills include:

- None/I was well prepared (most frequently cited)
- Program to prepare for transfer
- The Compass test put me back
- Additional knowledge of the transfer process / additional advising
- Financial aid/scholarships

Several students responded with specific comments regarding their transfer experience, or their overall experience at NMC.

Satisfied students' comments include:

- A positive overall experience, enjoyed the experience
- Helpful instructors, great relationships with instructors
- Individual attention and smaller classes were great
- A great place to start, I was well prepared after attending NMC
- Good education at a low cost

Specific changes suggested include:

- Improve transfer support (counseling, financial aid)
- Increase parking availability
- Offer a four-year degree
- Communicate with prospective transfer schools
- Keep updated with what other colleges are doing, specifically in the Culinary program
- Certain classes are not offered both semesters
- Need more accurate information regarding classes that will not transfer
- There was some questionable adjunct faculty
- Need more scholarships available for students with different backgrounds
