Criteria for ELOs at NMC:

1. The experience is structured, intentional and authentic.
2. The experience requires preparation, orientation and training.
3. The experience must include monitoring and continuous improvement.
4. The experience requires structured reflection and acknowledgement.
5. The experience must be assessed and evaluated.




Art & Activism presented by PTK

This exhibit is part of their Honors in Action project that explored the theme



Expressions of Truth in the overarching study topic: To the Seventh Generation – Inheritance and Legacy. Their project, **“Utilizing Art and Activism to Build New, Inclusive Legacies in a Divided Community”** included visits to multiple Denno Museum exhibits, traveling to the Jim

Crow Museum of Racist Memorabilia, and meeting virtually with a docent from the Southeast Michigan Holocaust Museum who lost all but her mother in the Concentration Camps. The chapter reviewed over 100 journals, books, periodicals, and podcasts during their research phase and they are excited to facilitate the Curiosities session in March, in conjunction with Kerrey Woughter.




International Services & Service Learning

Student Feature & EL Champion Spotlight



Student Feature: Destiny Roy

Paris, France is a long way from Mancelona, Michigan. So is Amman, Jordan and Tripoli, Libya, but NMC student Destiny Roy, a sophomore from Mancelona has, or will be, connecting with all three during her studies at NMC! Her desire to understand other cultures is something she did not have a lot of time to do while still in high school. However, after a couple of semesters at NMC, she decided to take the risk with a few experiential opportunities to see if it was something she would enjoy. Suffice to say, the answer is an unequivocal yes!

Destiny participated in the IREX Global Solutions Conversations, facilitated by Sarah Montgomery-Richards, which provides students at community colleges and universities the opportunity to discuss global challenges inspired by UN Sustainable Development Goals with student peers in Jordan and Iraq. She participated in four virtual sessions which focused on Food Insecurity. The group focused on solutions such as food banks and fundraising. After the sessions, Destiny reflected on her experience and made connections to home and the food insecurities facing our nation and area.

Destiny also participated in the Soliya Connect Program, part of Jim Bensley's HUM 116 World Cultures course. She was able to talk with other students from the Netherlands, Libya, Dubai, Venezuela, and Iran to mention a few. She was very nervous at first but then gained the confidence to speak up and share. The group discussed topics such as Women's Issues and Mental Health. A student in Libya shared that mental health is not highly recognized so if someone is struggling they need to have a physical symptom to be seen by a physician. "It makes me a better person to learn about others... as we are more similar than we think." Destiny will be traveling to France this spring with a team from NMC led by Jim Bensley and Kristen Salathiel. "It's a great opportunity to do a first hand observation of a different culture." She is excited to experience her first plane ride along with traveling outside the country.

EL Champion Spotlight: Jay Smith

"Since the Fall of 2020, experiential learning has been a fundamental element of my introduction to engineering course. Instead of abstract concepts of what it means to be an engineer, our students experience the engineering design process in the context of improving an aspect of NMC's campus. Our most recent project culminated in the design of a scale model of the solar system for NMC's main campus, which was presented to the board of trustees on January 24. Since incorporating these EL elements, I have witnessed higher levels of student engagement, ownership of their work product, and a greater sense of community among the class, all while operating in a remote format. This semester, we are back in-person and tackling another project, which I look forward to sharing with the NMC community at a later date."
